

Cub Scout Pack 1501 Camping Guide

Things to Bring

Medications (if needed)	Scout Handbook
Hat and Sun Screen	Insect repellent
Water bottles with water	Tent and tarps
Sleeping bag and pad	Air Mattress or Cot (optional)
Toiletries (soap, tooth brush, etc.)	Flashlight and spare batteries
Pillow	Rain Gear
Towel	Camera
Extra change of clothes/shoes	Change of clothes for Sunday
Plastic bag for dirty clothes	Pens/Pencils/Notebook
Food/Drinks/Ice Chest	Propane Cooking Stove (optional)
Chairs	Fishing Gear (if applicable)

Guidelines:

1. All scout leaders MUST take BSA youth protection training. We encourage all parents to take youth protection training. You may take this training on-line at www.myscouting.org.
2. Scouts and Parents should follow the buddy system at all times.
3. Vehicles are allowed in campsites only for loading and unloading of camping gear. Vehicles must remain in designated parking areas at all other times. In accordance with BSA national standards, no one will be allowed to ride in the back of a truck at any time.
4. No pets or animals.
5. Showers and restroom facilities are available near campsites.
6. No fueled lanterns, stoves or candles are permitted in tents.
7. No motor homes or camper trailers.
8. **No alcohol, firearms, BB guns, bow & arrows, or sheath knives permitted. Violations to this rule are punishable by removal from camp.**
9. No smoking permitted.
10. **No individual campfires. Fires are limited to pack level IF conditions permit and based upon camp site rules.**
11. No Bicycles, Skateboards or scooters allowed.
12. **Pocket knives are subject to BSA rules and are ONLY PERMITTED by those scouts who have earned their Whittling Chip card. The Whittling Chip card must be with the Scout for the campout, or the scout will not be able to use the knife. At all times, the scout MUST follow BSA safety rules.**
13. Do not climb on any fences or trees.
14. Check the Weather prior to the trip and dress accordingly.
15. Closed toe shoes are required at all times. No flip-flops or sandals.
16. **Adults are not permitted to sleep in the same tent as youths that are not their own children.** No exceptions. Youths can sleep in tents with other non-family youths.
17. Video games such as Nintendo DS should be left in vehicles at all times.
18. Late arrivals, please report to the Activities Coordinator (Roger Bringmann)
19. Be sure and bring your Handbook with you so you can work on other outdoor achievements and electives in your spare time. HAVE FUN!
